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The current state of the Practice of Pharmacy; Counseling and meeting the demands of the Public

When looking at our profession, it is often good to look back to where we were, where we currently are, where we are going and what it will take to get us there.

Pharmacists are increasingly being called upon to provide a higher level of services to the public in the ever changing healthcare industry. Our model of practice is continually being expanded to ensure that our knowledge and services are provided to the public for the betterment of their health. I only see this trend expanding in the future, with the increasing demands being made on the healthcare industry. It is important that we, as pharmacists, look to those as opportunities to provide our professional services. Not all that long ago a pharmacist providing immunizations was such a novel idea. Now look at the massive amount of immunizations that are provided by pharmacists and the huge impact that it has on the public, as we are the most accessible of the healthcare professionals. With increasing roles comes increasing responsibility. This causes us to look at our everyday functions to ensure that we are providing the utmost, safest and highest level of care we possibly can to our patients.

At the core of our profession, is talking to and educating our patients on their drug therapy to assure they are safeguarded and educated on their medications which we are providing to them. Counseling patients on both their new and refill prescriptions not only educates them on their medications, but also opens up the lines of communication to address the concerns the patient may have, which ultimately leads to better healthcare. Patients usually have a basic understanding of their drug therapy and can inform you of changes they are experiencing in their health. The gathering of information leads to better patient care, improved therapeutic outcomes and a reduction in dispensing errors.

Nearly every complaint that the Board of Pharmacy receives could have been avoided, even prevented, with a proper consultation. The Board of Pharmacy has had some very extensive conversations about the requirement of consultations in our pharmacies and how we can seek to improve the current practice of our profession.

The Board of Pharmacy Compliance Officers are reporting non-compliance with our current requirements of consultation on all, both new and refill prescriptions, by a pharmacist or a pharmacy intern. The Board is studying the consultation process and understands the current business climate in a retail pharmacy setting may not be conducive to the pharmacist providing a full detailed consultation on every prescription.

North Dakota prides itself on our current standards of practice which we have provided and maintained relative to our Pharmacy Technicians. We are leaders in requiring high educational standards to ensure competent and well trained individuals are helping to provide the highest level of services.

The Board is looking to our Pharmacy Technicians to see how they may fit into assisting a pharmacist in screening patients on refill prescriptions. This would involve asking open ended questions to help determine a patient's understanding of their medications. While proper responses by the patient would not impose any further interaction with the pharmacist, problematic responses in the answers from the patient would lead the Technician to alert the pharmacist to consult with the patient.

The Board of Pharmacy is moving forward on rules to outline this process. A public Rule Hearing is planned for the North Dakota Pharmacists Association [NDPhA] on Saturday April 30, 2016 at the Radisson Hotel - 605 E Broadway Ave in Bismarck, ND. These new rules allowing a Registered Pharmacy Technician to screen patients on refilled prescriptions for pharmacist consultation will also be posted on our website for your review.

The Board of Pharmacy will also update Consultation Requirements accordingly and the expectations for pharmacies that may be mailing prescriptions to our citizens. Having well-educated Registered Technicians screening patients may provide our pharmacies another option of assure our profession is interacting with every patient that seeks our services.

We, the Board of Pharmacy, welcome your opinions, input and expertise in drafting these rules to assure the right approach for the profession. It is our mission to ensure we continue to improve and provide the highest standard of pharmaceutical care to the public.

State Policy 2015

Here is a sampling of some of the pharmacy issues that states considered in 2015.



State pharmacy associations, along with their members, advocated for (and against) legislation on many different issues.

Provider Status

Designation, scope, and payment

Pharmacist Designation as a Provider

Although the definition of pharmacists as providers in state law isn't a magic fix for achieving provider status, it can break down barriers.

In 2015, there were 16 bills introduced and 8 bills passed where pharmacists were included in state definitions of healthcare providers.

*** ND Passed two bills in 2015**

Payment for Services

Serious impact on patient access to pharmacists' services

Of those bills pertaining to payment for pharmacist services that passed,

- Two affected Medicaid
- One affected private insurers
- One allocates funding to federally qualified health centers and specifically calls out pharmacists services as a use of such funding.

*** ND passed SB 2320!**

Scope of Practice

Scope of practice laws passed in 2015 included:

Improvements to pharmacist administration of immunizations

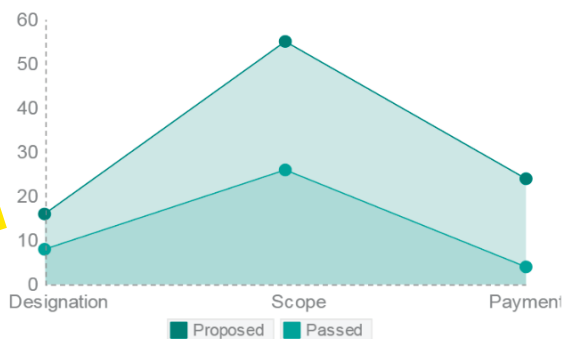
Collaborative practice changes: working with nurse practitioners, initiating therapy, and other improvements

Statewide protocols: pharmacist prescribing of naloxone, hormonal contraceptives, and others

Other State Issues in 2015

Biosimilars

Despite a continued lack of interchangeable biologics being on the market, great debate continues over state substitution laws across the country regarding physician notification of substitutions

MAC Transparency

State associations continue to refine their state MAC pricing provisions. As better, more enforceable laws are passed, the opposition has begun to take the debate to the court system

PBM & Audits

In response to continued reports from pharmacies of abusive auditing by PBMs, bills are introduced to protect pharmacies, and to create mechanisms for enforcement of existing laws

Federal Policy 2015

These are some of the pharmacy issues that Congress and regulatory bodies considered in 2015.



Congress and government agencies stayed busy with issues affecting pharmacy in 2015

Legislation

HR 592/ S 314

Pharmacy and Medically Underserved Areas Enhancement Act

To amend title XVIII of the Social Security Act to provide for coverage under the Medicare program of pharmacist services.

Introduced on 1/28/15.

Had 262 cosponsors in the House and 39 in the Senate by the end of 2015.

HR 793/ S 1190

Ensuring Seniors Access to Local Pharmacies Act

Allows any pharmacy in an underserved area to participate in a preferred Part D plan if they accept its terms and conditions.

Introduced on 2/5/2015 (House) and 5/5/2015 (Senate).

Had 75 cosponsors in the House and 10 in the Senate by the end of 2015.

HR 244

MAC Transparency Act

Ensures federal health plan reimbursements to pharmacies keep pace with generic drug prices increases.

Introduced on 1/9/2015.

Had 31 cosponsors in the House by the end of 2015.

S 776

The Medication Therapy Management Empowerment Act

Makes patients with a single chronic disease of cardiovascular disease, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, hyperlipidemia, or diabetes eligible for MTM services.

Introduced on 3/18/15.

Had 15 cosponsors in the Senate by the end of 2015.

Federal Regulations

Compounding

In 2015, FDA released draft guidance and the MOU between states and FDA for comment. Draft guidance included:

- Adverse event reporting for 503B outsourcing facilities
- Repackaging for 503A and 503B
- Mixing, diluting, or repackaging biologics

Pharmacy has expressed to FDA various concerns with the draft guidance and MOU. This includes concerns for how drug shortage situations will be handled, inconsistencies in definitions, and the interstate distribution limits.

EPA Rule

The EPA's proposed rule, "Management Standards for Hazardous Waste Pharmaceuticals," sets the standards EPA would apply in regulating pharmaceuticals that qualify as hazardous waste and bans sewerage hazardous waste pharmaceuticals.

APhA submitted comments and raised concerns regarding the impact this proposed rule could have on pharmacy practice.

DSCSA

After extensive advocacy from the pharmacy community, FDA delayed the enforcement of the track and trace requirements for dispensers - twice.

Once enforcement begins on March 1, 2016, pharmacists must collect and maintain the "3Ts" (transaction history, transaction information, and a transaction statement).

Also FDA published a public database for wholesaler/third party logistics companies information.

Biosimilars

FDA released a draft guidance on biosimilars naming on August 28, 2015. As proposed, biosimilars would have a shared "core name" with a unique suffix.

Many within pharmacy oppose this naming convention as it may be confusing for pharmacists when evaluating interchangeability.

Despite much activity at the state level, FDA has yet to release the framework for evaluating and approving interchangeable biosimilars.

2016

Because legislation from 2015 will carry over in 2016, we expect to see advocacy on these bills to continue into 2016.
