On January 28th, NDSU School of Pharmacy will complete another step in advancing the practice of pharmacy in North Dakota. Twelve pharmacists will participate in the first "Point of Care testing" training session, focusing on Strep, Influenza, Hep C, and HIV screening. This certification program has been developed by NACDS. Dr. Elizabeth Skoy and Dr. Alicia Fitz will conduct the day of training at NDSU, which will consist of 20 hours of CE. Members of NDPhA and NDSU faculty have met with BCBS to discuss potential reimbursement for providing this service to your patients. Because of the success of pharmacist involvement in providing immunizations to patients, BCBS was amenable to reviewing data and further discussions.

During 2017, NDPhA will be partnering with South Dakota Indian Health Services to provide certification training on immunizations and smoking cessation. Program dates will be sent out via email and/or provided in this newsletter.

Established in 1998, this award is given annually to an individual of high moral character, good citizenship, and elevated professional ideals. The recipient has made significant contributions to health-system pharmacy, including sustained exemplary service, an outstanding single achievement, or a combination of accomplishments benefiting the profession and public health. These may include achievements or outstanding performance that relate to health-system pharmacy: Practice, education, or administration; Research or development; Organizational activities; Scientific or professional writing; Journalism; Public and/or inter-professional relations activities; or Law, legislation, regulation, or standards of professional conduct.

NDSHP BEST PRACTICES AWARD

AWARD OF EXCELLENCE IN MEDICATION USE SAFETY

PHARMACY PRACTICE LITERATURE AWARD

The Pharmacy Practice Literature Award recognizes an outstanding original contribution to the peerreviewed biomedical literature related to pharmacy practice in hospitals and health-systems. Eligibility: The article submitted for the Pharmacy Practice Literature Award must have been published in a PubMed-indexed, peer-reviewed biomedical journal in the last calendar year. This article will be included in the nomination. For this award, the applicant must be a pharmacist. The applicant must be either the first or second author listed on the nominated article. To be eligible for this award, the applicant must have participated in each of the following: Substantial contributions to conception and design, or acquisition of data, or analysis and interpretation of data; Drafting the article or revising it critically for important intellectual content; and Final approval of the version to be published.

NDSU School of Pharmacy

NDSU Pharma Research Benefits Patients and Enhances Student Opportunities

John Runsvold takes pancreatic cancer personally. As a survivor, John is active in the Fargo/Moorhead Pancreatic Cancer Awareness Group. Once a student at North Dakota State University, John and his wife, Cyd, a graduate of the NDSU pharmacy program, say they see the value in a new research center at NDSU.

The Center for Diagnostic and Therapeutic Strategies for Pancreatic Cancer in the School of Pharmacy in the College of Health Professions researches ways to diagnose the deadly cancer earlier and develop therapeutic approaches that target the proliferation of pancreatic cancer cells.

The work of the Center is among many opportunities for students and faculty. Grant-funded research in pharmaceutical sciences in the College of Health Professions at NDSU has grown significantly to its current level of \$30 million cumulative grants awarded, including six competitive R01 grants from the National Institutes of Health.

Research areas in the School of Pharmacy include: pancreatic, colorectal and other cancers; Alzheimer's disease; bariatric surgery; cardiovascular; diabetes; engineering spider silk for targeted drug delivery; treatment of chronic bone infections; health promotion and disease prevention.

Students work side-by-side with faculty. Here's a look at some of the innovative research underway.

Jagdish Singh, chair and professor in pharmaceutical sciences at NDSU, received a \$1.89 million, five-year grant award from NIH to study Alzheimer's disease. The goal of the research is to develop a new delivery system that uses neurotrophic growth factor.

"By developing a mechanism to more efficiently deliver Nerve Growth Factor across the blood brain barrier, strides can be made to more effectively treat diseases such as Alzheimer's," explained Singh.

The research includes Dr. Takahisa Kanekiyo of Mayo Clinic, Jacksonville, Florida. Singh also received a \$328,000 competitive NIH grant to develop new insulin delivery systems, focusing on controlled release to deliver basal

level insulin for up to three months after a single injection in patients with type 1 diabetes.

Many approaches to fight disease

Colon cancer research also is underway at NDSU. Steven Qian, associate professor of pharmaceutical sciences in the School of Pharmacy, received a three-year \$435,000 grant from NIH. Qian's research focuses on creating more effective therapies to combat colon cancer and to lessen the side effects of chemotherapy.

Dr. Qian's team is researching the high level of an enzyme called cyclooxygenase (COX) in cancer and the more abundant Omega 6 fatty acids in human diets to determine how they can be used to control cancer growth and potentially make colon cancer therapies more effective. Qian also received a \$100,000 ResearchND grant for his work, and a grant from the Sanford Health NDSU Collaborative Seed Grant program.

In other cancer research, Sanku Mallik, professor of pharmaceutical sciences and D.K. Srivastava, a James A. Meier Professor of chemistry and biochemistry, lead the Center for Diagnostic and Therapeutic

Strategies in Pancreatic Cancer. Funded by a Center for Biomedical Research Excellence (COBRE) grant of up to \$9.62 million from the National Institutes of Health, it is the first disease-specific research center at NDSU. The Center conducts fundamental research with a focus on diagnostic and therapeutic tools for controlling the onset and proliferation of pancreatic cancer.

In additional research in the NDSU School of Pharmacy, some patients who undergo weight loss surgery to combat obesity don't lose the pounds they expect or they gain weight back. Kristine Steffen, associate professor of pharmaceutical sciences, serves as co-leader of a team that includes researchers from Cleveland Clinic, Brown University, University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, Kent State, Sanford Neuropsychiatric Research Institute and Sanford Eating Disorders and Weight Management Center.

The team's research is funded by a \$3.7 million, five-year rant award from NIH to examine how biological and behavioral factors interact in determining the success of bariatric surgery.

"Data and analysis from the study will be instrumental in moving toward individualized medicine in caring for patients with obesity that seek bariatric surgery," said Steffen, who also received a Sanford Health NDSU Collaborative Seed Grant for research.

Identifying potential new treatments

In the lab of Stefan Vetter, research assistant professor, there is a different research focus. A small protein that is part of the human body's immune system is released by white blood cells as part of inflammation, and binds metals to help keep them away from invading organisms.

Dr. Vetter developed a variant of a human protein with antimicrobial properties that could lead to novel treatments for skin infections and expand the range of topical antimicrobials available. He received a NDSU Development Foundation grant.

In the lab of Estelle Leclerc, associate professor, research involves pancreatic cancer. The research underway seeks to help better understand how certain characteristics and structures of cancer cells contribute to the development of tumors. These structures may conceivably become targets of drugs and other therapies. Leclerc received \$232,725 in NIH funding.

In the lab of Professor Stephen O'Rourke who also has received NIH funding of \$435,000, the team seeks to increase understanding of the cellular mechanisms underlying local control of blood vessel diameter. The group researches the role of potassium channels and endothelium-derived vasoactive factors in modulating vasomotor tone.

How to regulate blood pressure and identify novel targets to treat hypertension and other cardiovascular diseases occurs in the lab of Associate Professor Chengwen Sun, while in another lab, Assistant Professor Yagna Jarajapu investigates bone marrow-derived cells for vascular repair in diabetes. He also received \$308,000 from the American Heart Association to study vascular complications in diabetic patients.

Assistant Professor Venkatachalem Sathish studies asthma, COPD and pulmonary hypertension. Asthma occurs more frequently and more severely in pre-menopausal women and in aging men, suggesting it is impacted by testosterone and estrogen. He focuses on how and why the hormones influence the asthmatic airway—the first step to later develop novel therapeutics. His research is supported by more than \$2.6 million in competitive grants from NIH and other agencies.

Maybe not Spider Man but spider medicine

In the lab of Assistant Professor Amanda Brooks, golden orb weaving spiders do their job. Brooks and her team of students focus on finding innovative ways to deliver drugs to targeted locations in the body. The spiders are used in engineering spider silk to carry antibiotics to specific areas. The lab also focuses on chronic bone infections in military veterans.

Using 3-D printing and patent-pending technology, the research team investigates combining spider silk with other materials to give it new properties. Possibilities for future applications include "smart" compression bandages that self-adjust to wound

needs and 3-D encapsulated cells to model chronic bone infection for new drug development.

Dr. Brooks received a Phase 1 Venture Grant from the North Dakota Department of Commerce, an NDSU Foundation Centennial Endowment grant, a Sanford Health NDSU Collaborative Seed Grant, as well as NIH funding for her research.

Brooks and Dr. Sanku Mallik also received a \$251,750 grant from the National Science Foundation. The major competitive award covers an ultrasound imaging system to help researchers explore the structure and interactions of cell and tissue cultures.

For those such as graduate student Matthew Confeld, the opportunity to work in labs in NDSU's School of Pharmacy helps forge a future career path. "I decided to pursue a dual degree Ph.D. and Pharm.D., so that I can work on the forefront of drug research and implementation," said Confeld, who is interested in

biotechnology or developing trials for new drugs in the pharmaceutical industry.

Second-year pharmacy student Arianna Vidger found that the details and complexity of Sudro lab research provided tools to apply in her future career. "There are starts and stops, problems to be solved, mistakes that must be corrected, and timeconsuming processes that may or may not give the expected results," said Vidger. She plans to become a hospital pharmacist.

"In many instances, our faculty compete nationally for research funding," said Charles D. Peterson, dean of the School of Pharmacy at NDSU. "Their success illustrates the caliber of research underway which provides additional opportunities for students."
